



“Susx, an abbreviation; privately printed” / “An abbreviation is a short way of writing a word or a phrase that could also be written out in full. Abbreviations must be clearly distinguished from contractions (an apostrophe is used in writing contractions), that is, shortened forms of words from which one or more letters have been omitted.
