



\* Glassine provides a protective barrier to air, moisture, and grease: as a smooth, translucent interleaving covering a photograph or an illustrative plate; in envelopes for storing etymological or philatelic specimens; for gummed stamp hinges; and a variety of wrapping. While ordinarily glassine is not used like conventional 'paper' but in single leaves, it is accumulated here to make a 6mm thick bookblock, and its bulk is relatively heavy—the book weighs over 0.75kg—the delicate separateness of its unprinted pages are almost like the layers in mica, or somesuch mineral element.
